

Teen Lures Prevention Program

This is a brief overview of the types of Lures that will be taught to Lexington Middle School students. Please refer to your parent handbook "Let's Talk Teens" for detailed information. Authority Lure

Uses their power over teens to coerce or daunt them into sexual abuse. (example: Summer Coach, posing as an authority figure) (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

Affection Lure

Someone using their caring or romantic relationship to control the other in inappropriate manner (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

Assistance Lure

Someone who pretends to need help in some way or offers to help the teen to manipulate the teen into an unsafe situation (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

Ego Fame Lure

The offender uses charm and praises to manipulate teen by promising fame (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

The offender uses technology to lure them into an unsafe situation (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

E- Lure

The offender uses the teens name to lure them into an unsafe situation, (name on their jersey) (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

Name Lure

The offender uses online gaming or other games to lure the teens into an unsafe situation/ sexual abuse. (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).

Games Lure

The offender uses "its an emergency situation" to lure the teen to go with them or meet somewhere. (Refer to "Let's Talk Teens" parent handbook).
